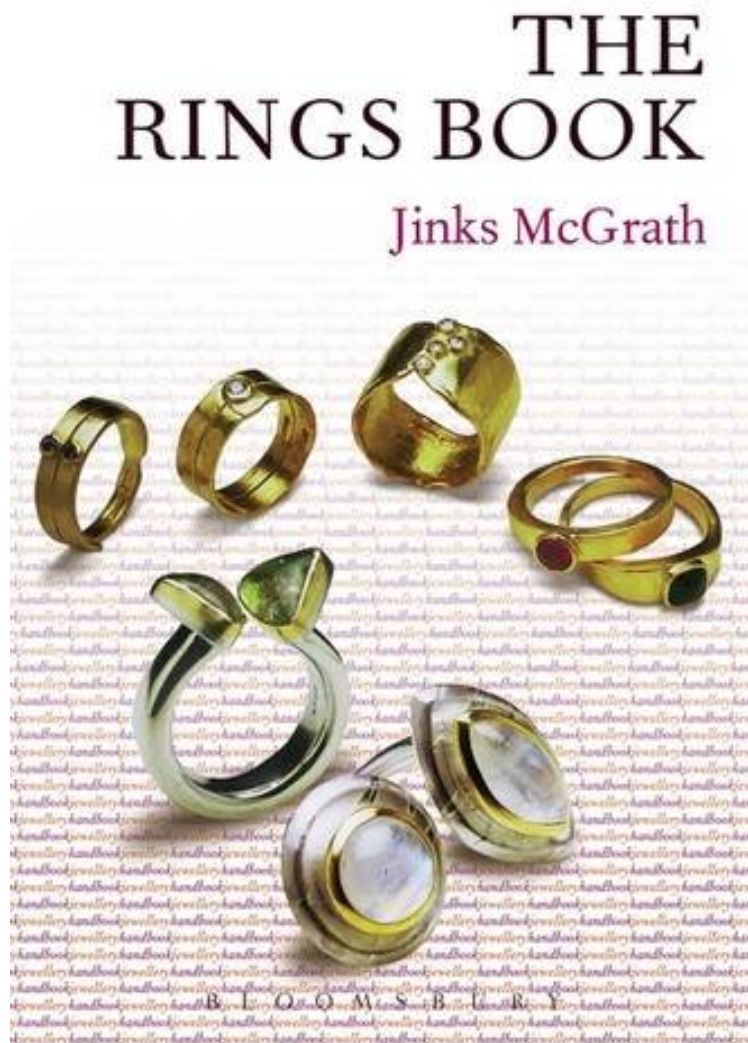

Beautiful projects, but not very usefulBy ReaderWhile this is a clearly written, well illustrated book, the target audience may be quite narrow: advanced enough to skip details of basic operations and some construction details but still quite basic (bezels are clearly explained, for example).The project rings are beautiful and include some interesting techniques (setting stones from behind and tapered chevalier ring, for example). Personally, I found little new in the book.Jinks McGrath includes basic setting instructions as well,

but neglects to give stone characteristics enough emphasis. Fluorite is much too soft for a beginner to bezel (most tools will scratch fluorite easily) and tanzanite has perfect cleavage: it will easily chip or split during setting. Even experienced setters are wary of these stones. The stone lover in me also protests against the ugly, washed out pictures of stones used in the List of Stones. I was also not impressed with her technique for tension setting. All the work hardening is lost when the piece is (unnecessarily) soldered. This way, the stone can easily fall out, even with the beads holding it (which won't help if something forces the ring out). 0 of 0 people found the following review helpful.
